Some of the entries include, but are not limited to;


- Large Animal entries with classes in showmanship, conformation, animal husbandry, and costume.

# Camp Belay Jeff Penn



On June 28<sup>th</sup>, 14 youth ages 10-15 left Brunswick County 4-H with their fearless leader Angie Lawrence, 4-H Youth Development professional for a week of camp, near Reidsville, NC in Rockingham County. Brunswick County 4-H had youth participating in three different types of camping experiences based on age and experience. Three youth participated in traditional camping one of four types of camping experiences offered at BJP, where they took part in 4-H enrichment activities such as





canoeing, archery, horseback riding, canoeing, archery, climbing, swimming, arts & crafts, and nature exploration. Six youth participated in the Adventurers camping experience where they also took part in many of the same camping experiences but additionally they participated in team-building, and high ropes that aided these youth in building skills that would help them pack up and leave their comfy cabin beds to set up camp in the woods, where they set



up their own tents, prepared their own camp fires, and cooked their own meals. Then, we also had five campers participate in the Trekkers program, this is simi-

lar to Adventurers, except they train to go completely off site and canoe down the Mayo River and climb Pilot Mountain, then back-pack to their primitive camping spot.

Campers returned to Brunswick County Friday, July 3rd while excited about their week at camp and ready to return next year. Some will even return next year as Leaders in Training. While they all have fond memories, and many made lifetime friends, they returned with life skills learned through 4-H camping that they will use for a life-time.





Brunswick County 4-H Teens in Leadership Training (TiLT) youth volunteer program, was on the road this summer traveling to camp sites and other programs to teach.

On June 19<sup>th</sup>, 4-H youth volunteers taught healthy living with the Organ Wise Guys characters to 70 BIP students. Organ Wise Guys (OWG) is evidence based program with a comprehensive curriculum built around a group of characters that personify major organs of the body to teach children (and adults) about the importance of eating well and being physically active. BIP students learned about



MyPlate and decorated placemats. Then on the same day using Organ Wise Guys' they taught Belville Elementary Communities in Schools (CIS) summer program students about

"Concentrating on Fruits



and Veggies." Students learned the benefits of eating fresh fruits and vegetables, while connecting them to the colors of the rainbow. This lesson and other OWG's lessons will be taught through-out the summer at CIS, church, and library programs in Brunswick County.

June 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> 4-H youth volunteers taught close to 100 youth in Brunswick County how to make connections between what

they do and the impact on their environment. Using the EnviroScape® hands-on model students at Communities in Schools sites - Jessie Mae, Supply, Southport Elementary, and Belville; and Boiling Springs Lake Parks and Recreation Summer programs learned about point and non-point source pollution. These students also learned the importance of water conservation and the importance of wetlands to our watershed. (Continued page 4)





Friday, July 24<sup>th</sup> – Vermicomposting – Participants learned about vermicomposting by participating in an interactive reading of the book "An Earthworm's Life," enjoyed a skit, and plant a seed. Students will be given information to take home on how to start vermicomposting and how to use it for their take home plant.





Friday, July 31<sup>st</sup> am – Organ Wise Guys "Concentrating on Fruits and Veggies" – Participants can identify and recall the names of fruits and vegetables in a rainbow of color and recognize the importance of eating a variety of fruits and vegetables through an interactive reading.





Summer is not the only season 4-H TiLT youth volunteers travel and teach. 4-H youth volunteers teach and can teach EnviroScape, Organ Wise Guys, and other programs through-out the school year at Communities in Schools afterschool, Parks and Recreation programs, Libraries and through other outreaches. ### Fear Fair



Demonstrations or illustrated talks are an excellent way for young people to develop and master public speaking skills. This event is designed to give 4-H members an opportunity to develop self-confidence and the ability to express him or herself in front of a group wile presenting educational material. On Saturday October 31, 2015 (times tba) Any Brunswick, New Hanover or Pender County 4-H member may participate in the 4-H Demonstrations or illustrated Talks. Any topic can be selected for demonstration. No animals may be used unless they have been approved by the fair board. No weapons, real or fake are permitted to be used. Classes are divided as follows:

- Cloverbud—participation only (ages 5-8 as of January 1)
- Junior Individual (age 9-12 as of Janua4ry 1
- Senior Individual (age 13-18 as of January 1)
- Junior Team (2 members ages 9-12 as of January 1)
- Senior Team (2 members ages 13-18 as of January 1)

When members of a team fall into a different age division, they must compete in the older division. Demonstrations or illustrated talks should last between 5 & 12 minutes. Any time to answer questions will not be considered part of the demonstration time. Demonstrations and illustrated talks will be judged using the 4-H Presentation Evaluation. Suggested premiums: \$5-\$20 (TBA)






Summer Events
